

Despite a challenging external social, political and financial environment, BWA has continued to flourish, delivering help and support to ever-increasing numbers of women in the Scottish Borders experiencing domestic abuse. Thanks to the dedication and commitment of our team, we are on track to meet most, if not all, of the goals we laid out in our Strategic Plan 2024-26.

Women's feedback to BWA continued to shape and develop our service. We encourage women who have used the service to participate in and contribute to local and national consultations on domestic abuse and coercive control. Their experiences and insights are invaluable and necessary to understanding and enabling the sorts of support that women want in order to move on with their lives.

In November 2024, we had an unannounced inspection from the Care Inspectorate. The inspector spoke with five women using the service. Extract from report:

Women using the service benefitted from working with a staff team with a strongly held value basis recognising women as experts in their own experiences, needs and wishes. One woman told us: 'Support was tailored to me and I felt heard and not judged'. This gave the women confidence that they were being listened to and that any support would be highly sensitive to their situation and would not generate further risk.

#### SOME FACTS ABOUT DOMESTIC ABUSE

- One in five women in Scotland will experience domestic abuse
- Police Scotland recorded 63,867 incidents of domestic abuse (latest figures)
- Four out of five incidents had a female victim and a male perpetrator (83%)
- 38% of female homicide victims were killed by a partner or ex-partner
- Two women a week in the UK are killed by a partner or ex-partner
- Suicide is now the leading cause of death in domestic abuse cases

Many experts call domestic abuse 'intimate terrorism'.

#### Refuge

We continued to support women in our refuge accommodation. We have two spaces which currently meet our needs, and shall continue to do so for the foreseeable future. The arrangements we have in place are continually being reviewed with feedback from women and our partners, to ensure they align with our 'whole woman' approach.

5 women and 3 children lived in our refuge accommodation during the reporting period. Our refuge was occupied for a total of 666 days, giving an 89% occupancy rate. The longest stay was for 255 days.

We had a very successful HMO inspection, which reflected what one of the families who stayed in the refuge said:

"The good thing about refuge was that it felt like a family home, and the area is nice and the kids liked it."

#### **Outreach**

Five years on, BWA's Outreach Service is now well established, and demand for this service continues to grow.

The number of women referred to the Outreach Service during this reporting period was 243, a 20% increase on the previous year. BWA responds to most referrals within 48 hours. Of these referrals, 186 women then received on-going support from the Outreach Service.

Over 50% were self-referrals, and the rest were referrals from partner agencies, including Scottish Borders Council's Domestic Abuse Advocacy Service and Police Scotland. DAAS referred 65 women for ongoing recovery support. There was a significant increase in the number of women referred by Mental Health – 10% of total referrals. The growing number of referrals from the Violence Against Women Partnership (VAWP) reflects the increased financial pressures across the sector as well as a recognition that BWA uniquely offers a specialist, holistic approach to women experiencing domestic abuse.

The Outreach Service is largely funded from the Scottish Government Waiting List Prevention. This grant ended in March 2025, which demonstrates the need to devote even greater efforts to grant applications and other forms of fundraising, so that the Outreach Service can continue to meet the needs of women experiencing abuse in our community.

"BWA means having people that actually see and understand the seriousness and impact domestic abuse has had on me. I've had counselling and felt like I was speaking to folk who didn't have a clue. However, at BWA it is brutally gut wrenchingly accurate and they really understand the trauma of it all. Genuine help and support. I feel I'm not on my own and have a better understanding of the complexity and validation of the abuse I suffered."

#### Own My Life (OML)

Own My Life - a 12-week online or in-person group programme to help women who have been subjected to abuse to regain ownership of their lives – was initially piloted back in 2022. It is now a fully embedded part of our Outreach Service, with online and face-to-face group sessions taking place right across the Borders. OML has been so successful that we have made the programme available to our partner agencies. 30% of OML attendees in the period were referred by partner agencies.

The National Lottery Community Fund will continue to fund this work until March 2026

#### **Escape the Trap**

BWA's outreach is centrally focused on supporting women experiencing domestic abuse. However, BWA also sees prevention as an important additional strand to the service, an investment to prevent future abuse. Escape The Trap (Teenage Relationship Abuse Programme) is specifically designed to help all young people, however they identify, to recognise the difference between a healthy relationship and an unhealthy one, and to understand how coercive and controlling behaviour negatively affects their lives. By raising awareness of abuse and educating our young people about healthy relationships, we aim to help empower their generation.

During 2024-25, we ran Escape The Trap sessions in Berwickshire and Hawick High Schools. Student responses were very positive.

"Learning about abusive relationships and being taught how to handle it. It is very helpful and will help me in the future".



#### Partnership working

BWA continued to play a key role in the Violence Against Women Partnership (VAWP), bringing a BWA perspective to bear. Over the year, we consolidated our partnership engagement and visibility at both local and national level, and identified ways we can work together.

Our commitment to partnership collaboration is reflected in our meetings with VAWP, NHS, Police Scotland, homelessness, housing and educational services, NHS and mental health organisations. We have worked across the board with local mother-and-toddler groups, schools, and colleges of higher education. At a national level, we were particularly pleased to be part of the Scottish Women's Aid consultation on Prisoner Early Release.

#### **DOMESTIC ABUSE FACT**

Domestic abuse is a substantial burden on the UK economy. The Home Office estimates the costs in the tens of billions, amounting to £34,015 per victim. These costs are borne by the exchequer through various channels, including the criminal justice system, healthcare, and support services for victims/survivors. The emotional and psychological costs to those individual women and children in terms of lost livelihoods, emotional and psychological hurt, and stunted lives, is incalculable.

enabled us to build a resilient, sustainable and effective service. However, we must acknowledge that there are significant financial challenges ahead as we anticipate the end of the major grants we have received in recent years. Unfortunately, our Scottish Government Waiting List funding ended on 31st March 2025, so we will be obliged to fund one of our key Support Worker positions from our reserves. Our current statutory funding structure does not cover our highly successful outreach service, for which there is a great, and an ever-increasing, demand. Continuing it without sufficient external funding is, quite simply, unsustainable.

Despite the cost-of-living challenges, we have been very fortunate in receiving donations over the period, and want to express our gratitude to everyone who has donated. We wish to acknowledge warmly the ongoing financial support from many local organisations and businesses who are listed at the end of this document.

All this financial uncertainty has made an increased focus on grant applications and other forms of fundraising an absolute necessity. Unfortunately, whilst necessary, these activities are hugely time-consuming, so we have hired a freelance communications consultant to help enhance and expand our communications capacity in line with our strategic plan. We intend to launch a major fundraising drive in November 2025 to coincide with the annual United Nations 16 Days of Activism against Gender-Based Violence campaign. We hope that our donors and partners will support us in this fund-raising drive.

#### Thank You!!
